PROFILE

The Tin Angel Opera, based on a libretto by **Paul Pines** from his widely acclaimed novel of the same name, with music by award-winning composer **Daniel Asia**, is set in the edgy world of the NYC Bowery jazz club, where a unique cast of characters play out a dramatic story as a call for redemption.

The inspiration behind the story is **The Tin Palace**, New York City's real-life jazz mecca of the 70s, founded by Paul Pines in 1973.

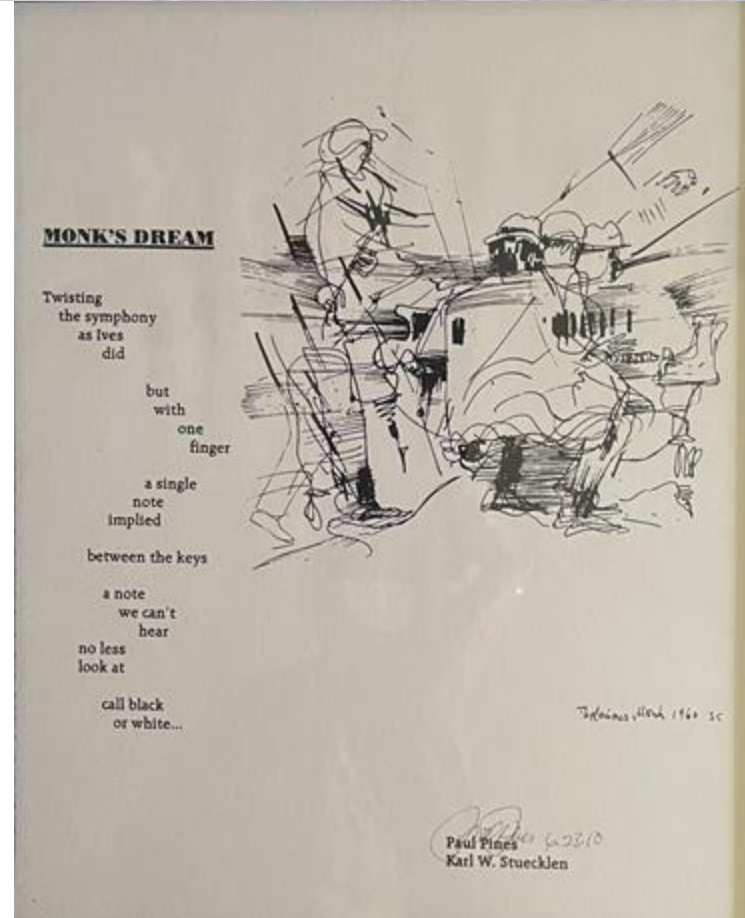


SYNOPSIS



The Tin Angel Opera, a new work of musical theatre, is a murder mystery set in **The Tin Angel Jazz Club**. It is inspired by the real-life **Tin Palace**, once a hotbed of New York City's music, nightlife, and multi-dimensional social life.

The production is anchored by Daniel Asia's sublime music, which skillfully places the jazz-opera genre in the setting of a dramatic no-man's land. Pablo Waitz, owner of the club, has lost his business partner, Ponce, and the club's cash reserves in a mysterious murder and drug deal gone awry. Outside on the streets, the dispossessed own New York City's East Village. Inside, musicians and artists, cops and hustlers, connect with the magical quality of the music.



SYNOPSIS (...continued)

Pablo's lover and Ponce's sister, Maria, mourning the loss of her brother, wants them to leave the 70s squalor of the Bowery.

Pablo is driven to recover the lost money and solve the mystery of his friend's violent death. Most of all, he desperately hopes to keep The Tin Angel alive.

Pablo's late father, who survived the Holocaust, walks the Bowery battlements questioning his son's dedication to this dissolute, shadowy world. His father is joined by Ponce, now also a troubled ghost, and both haunt Pablo.

The questions raised in this opera are timeless:

How do we find redemption?

How do we make a life out of love and loss?

How do we keep hope and find light in absolute darkness?



TIN PALACE

The Tin Palace was a jazz nightclub on the Bowery, founded by Paul Pines in 1973, in New York's East Village.

It was New York City's jazz mecca for much of the 1970s.

The club served as inspiration for the renowned *The Tin Angel* novel and later for the opera's libretto.

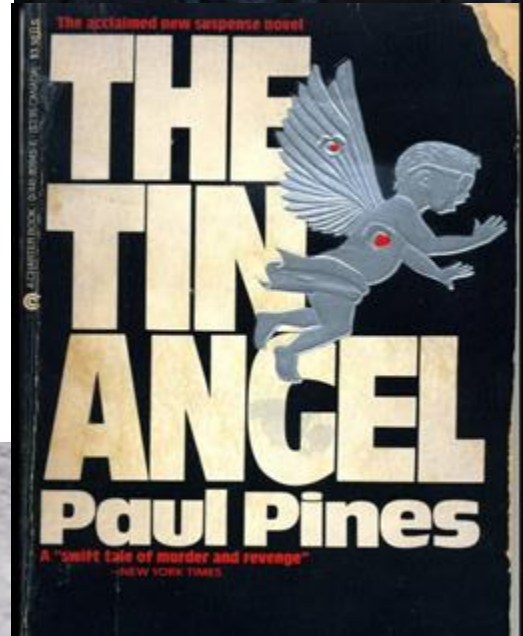


PAUL PINES - LIBRETTIST

Paul Pines (d. 2018) has a notable place in literary history as a prolific poet, writer, and memoirist.

He opened The Tin Palace on the corner of 2nd street and Bowery of Manhattan, which provided the setting for his novel, *The Tin Angel* and many of his subsequent poetry collections. A writer of over a dozen published literary works, including books of poetry, prose, novels, and his personal memoir *My Brother's Madness*, Pines was twice nominated for the Pushcart Prize (*Hotel Madden Poems* in 1991 and *Pines Songs* in 1993). He is also a recipient of multiple Adirondack Center for Writing Awards.

Along with his significant contributions to the literary world, Pines is also credited with enriching the world of jazz music. He founded, and for years programmed, as well as, hosted the prominent Jazz at the Lake: Lake George Jazz Weekend, recognized as one of the most important jazz events on the US east coast.



DANIEL ASIA - COMPOSER

Daniel Asia (b. 1953) is one of a small number of composers who has traversed all the realms of composition with equal skill. As testament to this, he is a 2009 recipient of an American Academy of Arts and Letters Award. Elliott Hurwitt writes in a Schwann Opus review of the composer's music, "*Daniel Asia is a genuine creative spirit, an excellent composer...He is a welcome addition to the roster of our strongest group of living composers.*"

His orchestral works have been commissioned or performed by the symphony orchestras of Cincinnati, Seattle, Milwaukee, New Jersey, Phoenix, American Composers Orchestra (New York City), Columbus (OH), Grand Rapids, Jacksonville, Chattanooga, Memphis, Tucson, Knoxville, Greensboro, Seattle Youth, Brooklyn, Colorado, and Pilsen (Czech Republic) Philharmonics. Asia's works have been performed by renowned conductors including Zdenek Macal, Jesus Lopez-Cobos, Eiji Oue, Lawrence Leighton Smith, Hermann Michael, Carl St. Clair, James Sedares, Stuart Malina, Robert Bernhardt, George Hanson, Jonathan Shames, Odaline de la Martinez, and Christopher Kendall.

He is a recipient of prestigious grants and fellowships in music, including a Meet the Composer/Reader's Digest Consortium Commission, United Kingdom Fulbright Arts Award Fellowship, a Guggenheim Fellowship, four NEA Composers Grants, a M. B. Rockefeller Grant, an Aaron Copland Fund for Music Grant, MacDowell Colony and Tanglewood Fellowships, ASCAP and BMI composition prizes, and a DAAD fellowship for study in Germany.

TIN PALACE JAZZ CLUB

FROM SPEAKEASY TO TIN PALACE JAZZ

You are standing in front of the 1970s home of the Tin Palace, a vital part of New York's alternative music scene. Originally a Federal-style 3-story, built circa 1830, it was allegedly a speakeasy run by gangster Meyer Lansky in the 1920s. In 1970, writer Paul Pines and partners converted the rundown property into a club that presented Brazilian music and jazz, wanting "to build up a grass-roots place, not to make a killing off the door." When writer Stanley Crouch and saxophonist David Murray moved in upstairs, they convinced Pines to add a Sunday avant-garde jazz series. Pines left in 1976, but Crouch continued the club's innovative spirit.



Until it closed in 1980, the Tin Palace was a destination for musicians and fans from around the world. The club continually fostered the most dynamic contemporary music, from Eddie Jefferson/Richie Cole and Sheila Jordan/Roswell Rudd, to Jimmy Giuffrè, James Blood Ulmer, Leroy Jenkins, Roscoe Mitchell, Paul Bley, Steve Swallow and Kalaparusha Maurice McIntyre. It also staged the first performances of the long-lived World Saxophone Quartet."

WINDOWS ON THE BOWERY

The Bowery is NYC's oldest thoroughfare. Originally a Native American thoroughfare and Dutch farm road (Bowery means farm), it is a cradle of American culture, with central links to Pop Culture, rockabilly, Polish theater, Lincoln, Tin Pan Alley, Irving Berlin, Satire of Broadway Expressions, Beat literature, jazz and punk rock. Though listed on the National Register of Historic Places, out-of-scale developments are replacing its residents, small businesses, and historic character.
